Midtown District Blotter - Burglaries, Theft from Autos, Theft of Autos

[Note: Your editors may swear off crime reports for awhile after this issue. Doubtless, everybody has had a chance to get the message. Here goes, one more time.]

We are, again, seeing an increase in burglaries, theft from autos, and theft of autos in the Midtown District. These are not specific to one area but are throughout the district!

Burglaries:

- Items taken from open garages while people are working in the yard (front or back) or inside the house
- Homes being entered while residents are home, many times sleeping, through an unlocked door
- Homes being entered through an unlocked door while residents are away
- Home video cameras show people checking common locations for extra keys: top of door frames, under rocks, etc.

Theft from Autos:

- Unlocked vehicles being rifled through and items taken
- Locked vehicles having car windows smashed out to take items of value that are in plain view
- · Vehicles in underground parking garages targeted under same circumstances as above

Theft of Autos:

- Vehicles are stolen when keys are left inside the vehicle
- When entry is made to the home, the burglars take keys and steal the car
- If you have push button start, leave your keys in the house and try to start the car. If it starts, there is a valet key tucked away somewhere in the vehicle. This needs to be found and removed from the car.
- If you keep your car/house keys on key hooks inside the door or in a basket near a door, consider moving them somewhere out of sight

City of Madison Watershed Studies

The City of Madison Engineering Division is conducting large watershed studies to try to address areas hardest hit by flooding last summer; most damage was on the west side. In 2019 – 2020 the City will focus on eight watershed studies: Madison Pheasant Branch, Strickers/Mendota, Spring Harbor, Wingra West, Willow Creek, McKenna Blvd Gammon Ln, East Badger Mill Creek, Dunn's Marsh. These studies will help the City identify existing problems, develop solutions, and prioritize improvements. The City held public information meetings for the first four watershed studies in April and May 2019. The Division also posted a new interactive map for the community to keep updated on the progress in each

watershed study: www.cityofmadison.com/live-work/extreme-weather/flooding

A watershed is the area of land that drains precipitation (rain, snow, etc.) to a common low point, such as an inlet, stream, or lake. Drainage is determined by surface terrain and the underground pipe system. Sunset Village is in the Willow Creek Watershed, which drains to the north to Lake Mendota. The public information meeting (PIM) for the Willow Creek study is anticipated for late summer or early fall. It should help explain flooding in Sunset Village—why it happens in certain locations, storm sewer deficiencies—and suggest solutions.






Unleash Fido at the Odana School Dog Park

The newly enlarged Odana School Park is the closest to Sunset Village of Madison's eight off-leash dog parks. The addition of 1.8 acres to the former 1 acre raises the size above the currently recommended minimum of 2 acres, which should allow for healthy turf, and address muddy conditions after rains. Parks staff restored the damaged turf in what is now the small dog area, planted trees for shade, and will be adding more picnic tables for seating.

The park is located at 678 S. Segoe Road; the off-leash dog exercise area is near Segoe and Whitney Way. 


Jumping in the Lake? - Check Beach Conditions First

Food Composting Services Come to You

Neighbors on Nextdoor got into a discussion recently regarding composting services. Local recommendations included Curbside Composter, Earth Stew Compost Services, and Rooted Curbside Compost. Compost services typically provide a clean 5 gallon bucket with lid, and pick up the full bucket at the curb once a week. They all accept fruits and vegetables, meal scraps, soups, nuts, breads, cereals, pasta, egg shells, coffee grounds and filters, and teabags. Compost may go to community gardens or local organic farms; customers may have the option of receiving finished compost. Typical rates are seven to \$10 per week. Check out their websites.





Toilet Rebate Program Hits 1 Billion Gallons of Water Saved

A cornerstone of Madison's water conservation initiative reaches a major milestone – one flush at a time. There's nothing all that exciting about a toilet. But 17,126 toilets? That's another story. In 2009, Madison Water Utility began offering customers \$100 rebates to replace old, water-wasting toilets with high-efficiency EPA WaterSense models. Since then, thousands of Madison home and business owners have taken advantage of the Toilet Rebate Program, replacing more than 17,000 old toilets and saving an estimated 1,088,847,183 gallons of water.

"That is a big number," says Madison Water Utility customer service supervisor Marie Van Aartsen. "We're excited to save such a large amount of such a precious resource." Van Aartsen says old toilets are notorious water wasters. That vintage 1950s pink toilet sitting in the downstairs half bath? It likely uses 5 gallons of treated drinking water with every flush. "That was just the norm. You really didn't think about it," Van Aartsen says. "But we want people to think about it. The Toilet Rebate Program has a dual function – besides saving water, it's also a way for us to get the conservation message out."

Old water-wasting toilets can also be seen in businesses, restaurants and bars across Madison. That's why Madison Water Utility recently expanded its rebate program to include all buildings – from schools to apartments to restaurants and shopping centers. The Toilet Rebate Program's \$100 bill credits are first-come, first-served until funding is exhausted.

"If you haven't replaced a toilet, definitely look at our program," says Van Aartsen, noting that the Toilet Rebate Program has saved participants \$5.7 million in water and sewer costs over the last decade. She also points out that replacing old toilets is about more than conserving water. "It's not just the water, but the energy it takes to get the water out of the ground and pumped out to all the homes and businesses in our community. It's a second resource that we're also saving," she says. The program has saved about 2.2 million kilowatt hours of electricity so far, equivalent to the amount of electricity needed to power 276 Madison homes for a year.

Midvale Boulevard Ped/Bike Crosswalk Near Yuma – Who has to Stop?

Many questions have come up regarding the bike/crosswalk with overhead lights on Midvale Blvd near Yuma.

- Who has to stop?
- What about the small stop sign on the bike path?
- What does "a person riding a bike in a manner which is consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by pedestrians" mean?

This is considered a crosswalk at an uncontrolled intersection.

- What is an uncontrolled intersection? Based on Wisconsin State Statute §346.24(1), an uncontrolled intersection is defined as "an intersection or crosswalk where traffic is not controlled by traffic control signals or by a traffic officer." Marked crosswalks warn drivers to expect people crossing and the Rectangular Rapid Flash Beacon (RRFB) is a device to provide high-visibility warning to drivers when people are using the crosswalk. The RRFB is not a traffic control signal.
- What does that mean for vehicular traffic? Those entering and in the crosswalk have the right of way.
- What does that mean for pedestrians and bicyclists? You have to show intent to cross the road to signal for traffic to yield. This can occur by pushing the button which causes the lights to flash or by stepping off the curb.
- When is the pedestrian or bicyclist potentially in the wrong? As a pedestrian, if you make sudden movement into the roadway, which doesn't give motorists the opportunity to see you and stop, you could be at fault. As a bicyclist, you must always be moving at a slow enough pace to allow for motorists to see you and stop. This is the "bike in a manner which is consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by pedestrians." Bolting into the roadway could potentially find you at fault but will also probably hurt.
- Why don't bicyclists have to stop for the mini stop sign? Because it's a mini stop sign, therefore not official. The stop sign on the bike path requires the bicyclist to stop and yield to people using the sidewalk. Once the bicyclist proceeds across the sidewalk, the bicyclist has the same rights as permitted at any other uncontrolled intersection with a designated crosswalk.
- Why don't the police enforce the mini stop sign? The bicyclists still have the right of way, the stop sign is not official, and law enforcement can only enforce traffic laws on public roadways.

Zoom in on your street to see how it rates, and its initial construction year.



Spring Has Sprung at Midtown!



Lucia Crest Park playground replacement,

Kate Kane, Parks Division Landscape Architect reports, "Lucia Crest will be the last site started in the 2019 Playgrounds - Group 1 contract. The contractor started at Doncaster Park playground in mid-June and will be finishing there in the next week or two before moving on to Walnut Grove - which is all a long way of saying that the existing playground at Lucia Crest will be intact for the 8/3 event [Sunset Village Ice Cream Social]." Hilldale continues to keep it fresh with new updates to the outdoor lifestyle center, including the addition of a park space in the corridor between Kate Spade and Morgan's Shoes. Take a break from shopping and relax in Hilldale's newly renovated Plaza, which will feature trees, shaded seating opportunities, benches with built-in device charging technology, and al fresco dining for Forage Kitchen, Crescendo Espresso Bar, and Bowl of Heaven. Construction is underway now and will continue until early Fall.

BMO Hilldale, submitted by Alexandra Patterson, WSDEVELOPMENT

The BMO at Hilldale plans to consolidate their existing branch office and drive thru into a brand-new building located at the existing corner drive thru parcel (4501 Vernon Blvd). Construction is scheduled to start early Fall 2019 and is expected to be open in 2021. Despite the current drive thru facility being demolished to make way for the new building, customers will continue to be able to take advantage of drive thru service in a temporary facility located on the current BMO branch parcel (401 N Segoe Rd).

University Ave is scheduled for reconstruction from Shorewood Boulevard/Hill St. to University Bay Drive/Farley Ave. The City of Madison is jointly participating with the Village of Shorewood Hills on the design and construction. The project includes reconstruction of pavement, curb & gutter, sidewalk as necessary, street lighting, traffic signals, water main, sanitary sewer and storm sewer. Design alternatives will include options to improve pedestrian & bicycle connectivity, bus rapid transit initiatives, and stormwater drainage. The City of Madison and Village of Shorewood Hills held a Public Involvement Meeting regarding the project on June 13th. The public was encouraged to offer ideas and comments on the design concepts for the project. In the early 1950s the University of Wisconsin-Madison Board of Regents formed a plan to sell 600 acres of University Hill Farms land (which was used by the School of Agriculture) to an expanding City of Madison. Station 9 was built in 1957, a few years before the construction of Hilldale Shopping Center. In a nod to that early history, the crew has claimed



and celebrates its identity as The Original West Side of Madison.

have such individualized logos.

- 1 Lieutenant Station officer overseeing crew
- 1 Apparatus Engineer (driver) operates the engine
- 2 Firefighters staffing the engine
- 2 Paramedics staffing the ambulance
