Greetings Neighbors,

As your new president, I'd first like to thank Janice Antoniewicz-Werner for her fine service, our SVCA officers and newsletter carriers, and everyone who coordinates events such as our ice cream social, garage sale, Easter egg hunt, and Halloween parade. Those are the things that make our neighborhood so great! I encourage everyone to attend the upcoming events, and likewise to volunteer your help.

During the next couple of months I envision most of my efforts going into the Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan, and I welcome your input. Many of you have asked me questions about this, so I will answer your three most frequent: What are your views on new development projects? It depends on whether the scale, form and use are appropriate with and enhance our neighborhood, and most importantly, that it is desired by the neighbors rather than driven by outside interests. What were the results of SVCA neighbors'votes on the proposed 'Focus Areas' at the last SVCA meeting? The full data are available upon request, but briefly, the percentages who voted for a maximum of 2-stories in each area were: Hill St-30%, Harvey St-50%, Univ. Ave-26%, Midvale-48%, Palomino/Eugenia-89%, Stevens/ Bluff-78%, Speedway/Mt Olive-85%. Will the neighborhood plan reflect that input? The draft is still preliminary, a work in progress. A point of flux is the extent to which neighborhood or other desires should prevail. Two important events are the May 30th 6:30PM HPAJNP meeting soliciting public comment on the neighborhood plan, and the June 7th 6:30PM SVCA meeting.

I encourage you to participate in these and all meetings – we welcome your ideas and suggestions on neighborhood needs and activities, and always appreciate new participants. Finally, I hope you're enjoying this fantastic spring - it's the prettiest one I can remember, and judging by the smells of barbecue throughout the neighborhood, you're all making the most of it!

Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan Update

A quick review: The City of Madison Department of Planning & Community & Economic Development is working with the Sunset Hills, Sunset Village, VanCheMasShe Neighborhood Associations, Hilldale Homeowners Association, and interested residents, businesses and stakeholders to develop a 5-10 year plan for the Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan study area. The Hoyt Plan is a supplement to the City



of Madison Comprehensive Plan and provides more detailed land use and design recommendations, with the possibility of suggesting amendments to the Comprehensive Plan. Vandewalle & Associates, a private consulting firm based in Madison, is assisting the City and the community to prepare the plan under a \$50,000 City of Madison neighborhood

grant.

The quarterly SVCA meeting on February 17 gave participants another chance to comment on the potential redevelopment areas discussed in the Hoyt Plan second public meeting back in December--Bluff/Stevens St., Midvale Blvd., Mineral Point/Speedway, University Avenue East and University Avenue West. Another focus group meeting on March 1 at Bethany Church was devoted to discussion of recommendations for the Mineral Point/Speedway area, which includes the Mt. Olive site.

A Quarry Park walk-around on March 26 brought together neighbors of the park and Hoyt Plan area residents making their first visit to this 16 acre wild park in our midst. Si Widstrand, retired from the Madison Parks Department, was on hand to answer questions and help lead the walk around the park. The informal consensus of this group was to leave the park more or less the way it is. A volunteer has collected a list of people who may form a Friends of Quarry Park at some time.

Components of the plan are in *draft* stages and will be released between March and May for additional public input. Mark your calendars for the 3rd Public Meeting to take place on Wednesday, May 30th at First Baptist Church, 518 N Franklin, from 6:30 -8:30 pm. All components of the plan will be ready to be reviewed.

Stormwater and Street Spring Cleaning

Even after an exceptionally mild winter, the City's spring cleaning efforts require considerable coordination. Three departments— Engineering Operations, Streets, and Water Utility-work together to implement a

praiseworthy street cleaning program. The steps include street

sweeping and catchbasin cleaning before hydrant flushing begins. program has been in place for about 3 years and has

prevented a significant amount of trash and sediment from reaching our waterways. If we didn't flush our hydrants onto relatively clean streets, not only would the debris wash into the lakes, it could also clog storm inlets and cause localized flooding.

The Streets Department got an early start on street sweeping due to the unusually mild winter. We had two street sweepers and a smaller bike path sweeper out two months ahead of schedule. All nine of our street sweepers have been out since March 3rd. Sweepers work double shifts until every street in the city is swept twice. In 2011, we collected 6,525 tons of debris through street sweeping.





With a staggering 100 billion plastic bags used each year in America, they are a major contributor to our nation's overflowing landfills, amounting to a reported 15% of all garbage in America. Plastic bags are lethal: Animals, especially birds and fish, often mistake the bags for food and choke on them – or in them. Moreover, as petroleum products, manufacture of plastic bags drains tens of millions of gallons of the finite, polluting substance each year.

Fortunately, the proliferation of plastic bags is one of the easiest environmental problems to address – we can choose not to use them! That's why for Earth Day 2012, local classrooms, Sustain Dane, and Metcalfe's Market are working to reduce Madison's use of plastic: All groceries sold at Metcalfe's Market on Friday, April 20th will be bagged in reusable,

recycled bags, each of which will feature a oneof-a-kind design by a Madison-area student.

"It is a wonderful opportunity to get young people thinking about the impact their everyday choices have on our planet and our future," says Jen Vena, a sixth grade teacher at Spring Harbor Middle School. Her students have been particularly alarmed to learn that there is a mass of swirling plastic debris in the Pacific Ocean larger than Texas.

More than 3500 bags will be decorated by students between April 13 and April 19.


Architectural Survey Meeting

Garlic Mustard in Quarry Park

It's that time again—garlic mustard in our parks and woods. Garlic mustard is a biennial herb that invades and spreads rapidly in wooded areas and roadsides, such as Quarry Park; it is termed "ecologically invasive" by the DNR. Garlic mustard is most easily recognized when it blooms in early May (more likely mid-April this year), and is controlled or eradicated by pulling in April and May, before it goes to seed. It can be identified by its cluster of small white flowers at the top and its round toothed leaves (not to be confused with the phlox-like Dame's Rocket). If your Eugenia or Rocky Ledge yard backs onto Quarry Park, please help by pulling the garlic mustard in your purview (and please don't pile brush over garlic mustard stands). Garlic mustard grows throughout the park, with concentrations along Stevens Street, the far west end, northwest ridges, northeast corner, and several central locations. Plants should be pulled getting the entire root and then bagged for disposal, or left in piles to be found for later bagging; please don't just fling them around, as they may still form seed from the flowers. 

Find a New Best Friend at the Shelter

Each year Dane County Humane Society (DCHS) receives approximately 3,000 dogs and cats brought to the shelter as strays. In 2011, the total was 1,109 dogs and 1,915 cats several of which came from this neighborhood.

Most of us never expect our beloved pets to be lost or stolen and we hope that leashes, fences and doors will be enough to keep them safe at home. The reality is that accidents do happen, and when they do, many owners are unprepared. Animal Service Officers report that the two biggest reasons dogs and cats become strays is because children and workmen inadvertently let them escape from the house or yard. Microchip is the best way to reunite lost pets with their owners because tags can get separated from the animal. The combination of a tag and microchip give the best of both worlds by providing a visual ID and an implanted ID. Have your veterinarian check your chip yearly to make sure it remains up to date and in place. No pet should be allowed outside its house without identification. Microchipping can be done on a walk-in basis whenever the shelter is open or by your veterinarian.

There is a wealth of information on the DCHS website (giveshelter.org) where one can search to determine whether your lost pet may be there or to learn how to search for and find your pet. Just click on the "Owner Support" link.

Sometimes circumstances arise that result in owners becoming unable to keep their pets. Some people release their pet into the wild or near a farm with the false belief that it will settle in and find a new home. Doing this is actually a very stressful experience and is an inhumane solution. If you need to find a new home for your animal, DCHS provides a free rehoming service via their website. Or, you may make an appointment to surrender your animal to DCHS for a small



You may still pick up 30 gallons of mulch (six 5-gallon buckets) for free at the Streets Division Transfer Station at 121 E. Olin Avenue, from 7 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.
