Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan Update

To review: The City of Madison Department of Planning & Community & Economic Development is working with the Sunset Hills, Sunset Village, VanCheMasShe and (the new) Rocky Bluff Neighborhood Associations, Hilldale Homeowners Association, Friends of Hoyt Park and interested residents, businesses and stakeholders to develop a 5-10 year plan for the Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan study area. The Hoyt Plan is a



supplement to the City of Madison Comprehensive Plan and provides more detailed land use and design recommendations. Vandewalle & Associates, a private consulting firm based in Madison, is assisting the City and the community to prepare the plan under a \$50,000 City of Madison neighborhood grant. Public input has included large community meetings, business and resident surveys, neighborhood walkabouts and focus groups.

Over 130 participants attended the 3rd Public Meeting on May 30 and reviewed all components of the Plan. The comment period went through Jun 22 and a great many comment sheets were returned to the City, as well as a flood of email comments.

The quarterly SVCA meeting on June 12, attended by 24, gave participants yet another chance to discuss the potential redevelopment areas detailed in the May draft of the Hoyt Plan. The former Mt. Olive site on Mineral Point Road remains the most contentious issue with residents on Westmorland, Hammersley and nearby streets still in disagreement with the

four design scenarios presented by Vandewalle in the Plan. To view the minutes of this spirited discussion go to the SVCA website.

On June 26, the City of Madison conducted a joint meeting with neighborhood association presidents and board members to review the May draft of the Plan, discuss next steps, and discuss key recommendations and unresolved issues. SVCA sent 5 residents to this meeting—Ken Raffa, SVCA president, as well as Sue Reynard, Melanie Kranz, Bev Flanigan and Liz Vowles; these last 4 are not board members but were



nominated at the June 12 SVCA meeting. The two issues of primary concern were sidewalks on Ridge, Harvey and Stevens Streets, of special interest to the Rocky Bluff NA; and the four design scenarios in the Plan for the former Mt. Olive site. The City left with another list of comments to add to the many garnered from the May 30 public meeting.

The revised Hoyt Park Area Joint Neighborhood Plan will be released in mid-August and will be followed by a review and comment period. The next SVCA quarterly meeting on September 6 will be mostly devoted to further discussion of the Plan as it nears its final form. Farmers Among Us

Sunset Village has a diverse professional population, public and private sector, blue and white collar, and, interestingly, a number of folks with farming connections. There are, in fact, three such people on one block of Eugenia Avenue and here are two of their stories. You are encouraged to add your stories to this series, Farmers Among Us.

Edgerton/Eugenia Connection

John Hurd has lived on Eugenia Avenue since 2010, but he still runs the family farm, Hurd Farm Inc., near Edgerton. John is the fifth generation on the farm, now 600 acres. His forebears walked across the country from the East in 1836 and settled along the Rock River. When John returned to the farm he and his father raised beef cattle until 1992 and John was still raising corn and soybeans until 2010; now most of the cropland is rented to neighboring farmers. John started his flower business in 1988, with dried flowers at first. Now he sells cut peony flowers as well as cut flowers from bridal wreath spirea, snowball viburnum and peewee hydrangea; and berries from highbush cranberry viburnum and winterberry holly-all raised on 12 acres. His flowers are sold to supermarkets through brokers; this year's peony crop went to Whole Foods stores in the eastern U.S. Our crazy 2012 weather has been hard on John's crops. He lost half his peony flowers to the March warm-up followed by April freezes; for the same reason there were no highbush cranberry berries or snowball viburnum flowers. Winterberry holly, typically sold and most appealing in October and winter months, may



be ready a full month early. Of course, for farmers and gardeners, there's always next year.

John gets away from the farm to spend every February and March volunteering with Mayan Families, a small non-profit organization which operates in the Highlands of Guatemala. But that's another story.

Blue Mounds/Eugenia Connection

I'm Liz Vowles, on Eugenia Avenue. I have been selling at the Dane County Farmers' Market since 1975. My husband, Lloyd Mueller, and I started growing a variety of vegetables and flowers but eventually settled on ornamental corn and pumpkins as our main crops. We moved to Eugenia Avenue in 1995. After Lloyd's death in 2000 I took a year off but resumed farming in 2002. Our growing plot is one acre of land in the valley on Highway Z south of Blue Mounds. I still grow the ornamental corn and small pumpkins (Jack-be-Little) for the market, as well as tomatoes, winter squash and large pumpkins for personal use and to spread the bounty among friends. I plant the corn and keep the weeds down with a tractor

(Ferguson TO20) mounted corn planter and cultivator as well as a hand hoe for weeds in the rows. The corn is picked by hand and in September you might find me husking it in the garage. We always saved our own seed from the nicest corn ears and added a little popcorn into the genetic mix to get shinier and more refined kernels. This year's drought has caused me, for the first time, to do a minimal watering of each of the approximately 2400 corn plants, so my corn is in somewhat better shape than most in the area. There are advantages and disadvantages to living in town and farming 25 miles away—I don't look upon weather disaster outside the window every day but may be slow to realize when a crop is really in trouble. It's a good year to be a very small farmer, as drought conditions go from moderate to severe.





Raising Monarch Butterflies in Sunset Village

Doug Anderson has been raising monarch butterflies for many years at his home on Eugenia Avenue. Every spring Doug buys swamp (also known as red) milkweed (asclepias incarnata) plants at a local nursery and sets them out in pots on his patio. He also has swamp milkweed as well as common milkweed (asclepias syriaca) in profusion in his back yard. The first monarchs appear in our area in May and lay their eggs on the still small milkweed plants. Later in June and July, when our native and garden flowers are in bloom, monarchs are more abundant and their eggs more easily spotted on the milkweed plants. Monarch butterflies prefer to lay their eggs on the swamp milkweed but the common milkweed has larger leaves, the better to support the caterpillar as it eats its way to an eventual length of at least two inches. (And does it eat—if you listen closely you can hear a large caterpillar chomping its way along a

leaf.) Milkweeds are also nectar plants for the adult butterflies, and are fragrant to us as well. Other nectar plants, which can be found in many Sunset Village yards, are verbena bonariensis, butterfly bush, butterfly weed, Joe-Pye weed, zinnias, purple coneflower, bee-balm, tithonia (Mexican sunflower).

Doug finds the eggs, or the tiny newly emerged caterpillars, on his outside milkweed plants and brings them in to his screened back porch for safety from predatory flies, wasps and birds. He hatched 17 monarchs from the first wave of egg laying, which occurred in May this year. Now he is finding eggs and nursing caterpillars from the second wave. He set a new record for himself in 2011 when he hatched 80 butterflies. He has also spread this enthusiasm to at least one Eugenia neighbor.

Forget the Grass—Water Your Trees

Madison Parks Department

The hot, dry weather conditions are stressful to newly planted trees. Over 5,000 street trees planted over the last two years are in need of watering. The City is asking homeowners to help by watering their newly planted trees in front of their houses. The root systems of these recently planted trees are not yet fully established and require some extra care. City trees as well as your own newly planted trees may require six to eight gallons of water every 10 days. The soil should be moist, not saturated. People are encouraged to water in the

early morning or early evening to minimize water loss from evaporation.

The Dane County Tree Board advises using shredded bark mulch to help retain soil moisture. Never pile mulch up against the

trunk. Start mulching about four inches out from the trunk, and don't apply it deeper than four inches. If the area has not been mulched before, water the ground deeply before mulching. Then water again after mulching to wet down the mulch so the next application of water is more effective. 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

Heat and Drought Breaking Records in Madison

With three days topping 100 degrees, a 1939 state record was broken. Due to early alert systems, hurricanes and tornadoes are not the most dangerous weather event; heat waves kill more Americans than any other type of natural disaster. The American Meteorological Society

reports that on average heat kills more than 1,000 people each year, and, in the 40-year period from 1936 through 1975, nearly 20,000 people were killed in the United States by the effects of heat and solar radiation.

In Madison, only 0.35 inches of rain was reported in all of June, breaking the previous record low of 0.59 inches set more than 100 years ago in 1895. The Governor declared a state



of emergency in 42 southern Wisconsin counties on Monday, July 9th, due to drought or abnormally dry conditions as Wisconsin continues to suffer from a brutal heat wave and lack of rain, and on July 12 the U.S. Drought Monitor upgraded the southern two tiers of Wisconsin counties from a moderate drought to a severe drought. Be safe and stay cool!

Grass Fires Sweep Across Madison

As dry weather continues, City of Madison firefighters are responding to an average of 3-5 grass fires every day. These extremely dry conditions have dramatically increased the potential for outside fires.

If you smoke, please discard cigarette butts with care; douse them in water or dispose of them in a non-combustible container designed for that purpose. Most fireworks are prohibited in the City of Madison with the exceptions of caps, snaps, snakes, party poppers and sparklers. However, residents are urged to refrain from using any fireworks during this

extremely dry weather. Open burning is strictly prohibited in the City, except in allowable outdoor fireplaces and grills under certain conditions, but residents are asked to refrain from using any outdoor fireplaces until the area receives some rain. If any fire poses a perceived nuisance or safety hazard, firefighters may be called and will extinguish those fires at their discretion. Residents who see smoke or fire in any grassy area are advised to call 911 immediately. Grass fires move very quickly on dry ground and require a rapid response to ensure containment.
