University Avenue 2022 Road Construction

The multi-use path on the north side of University Ave. will remain open until late July at which time a signed detour route will be put in place while the new pedestrian overpass is being constructed over University Bay Drive. <u>3005 University Avenue – the Long-time Home of Smoky's</u>

Alder Vidaver reports: Bagel's Forever is suing for prescriptive easement on this property, delaying the demolition and construction plans. If the suit is settled, the expectation is demolition will begin late summer/early fall, with construction starting in early 2023 and opening in spring 2024.

Development at the Former Kwik Trip at 3734 Speedway

Alder Vidaver reports on June 10: The mixed use development at 3734 Speedway (Stop-n-Go/Kwik Trip site) is undergoing site review with the City. Demolition of the existing building is expected later this summer/fall. Blackhawk at University Intersection Improvements & Bike Connections

Safety improvements are being considered for the intersection of University Ave at N Blackhawk Ave to eliminate serious/ fatal crashes and make it easier for people walking and biking to cross University Ave. Potential changes:

- Restrict left turns from Blackhawk Ave onto University Ave
- Left turns from University Ave onto Blackhawk Ave or Joyce Erdman Pl would still be allowed
- Create a diagonal two-stage crossing with a rapid flashing beacon crossing light for pedestrians and bikes
- The current crosswalk would be removed

The City of Madison is pleased to announce the launch of the Backyard Homes Project and the availability of new financing to support the development of Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). ADUs have been allowed in the City since 2013, but they required special approval through the conditional use process. In an effort to make easier the creation of ADUs, the City made ADUs a permitted use in all zoning districts where single-family homes are allowed.

The Redesigned Glen Golf Park is Now Open with Nine Holes

The Glen Golf Park, known since 1927 as Glenway Golf Course, was reimagined and renovated to create a unique mixed-use outdoor recreation golf park. Through the ongoing partnership with the Madison Parks Foundation, along with the shared vision and generous financial and in-kind contributions of many community members, the golf park offers a dynamic blend of programmed activities. The redesigned 9-hole golf course is suitable for first-timers and long-time golfers alike. The updated patio area is a fully accessible gathering space. The Glen House, formerly known as the clubhouse, is currently under renovation to provide accessible restrooms and service window along with overall improved guest experiences and expanded merchandise options. A variety of community events and activities will be offered throughout the summer, including a movie series and a performing arts series sponsored by Madison Parks Foundation featuring a variety of local live musicians, in addition to a cultural exhibition by The Ho-Chunk Nation and introductory fitness activities.

PLAYING THE COURSE

The redesigned 9-hole course is open for play, walking only. The Glen House is closed while renovations are completed. A temporary onsite kiosk is available for check-in. Tee times may be made online or by calling one of the other three City of Madison golf courses, during the Glen House renovation.

Know Your City of Madison Ordinances - City Chickens

Keeping backyard chickens has become more popular as we all found ourselves at home more. Before doing the chicken dance with your Rhode Island Reds or your Australian Australorps, check out the local ordinances for guidance. In the City of Madison you may keep up to four chickens on lots with up to four dwelling units. You must obtain an annual license prior to January 1. You are expected to provide a covered enclosure for your hens that is at least 25 feet from any residential structure on adjacent lots. There will be no cockadoodledooing because roosters are not permitted. For more details see sections 9.52 Keeping of Chickens and 28.151 Applicability of Zoning in the City of Madison Ordinances.

When a Dog Bites: How We Investigate to Prevent Further Aggression

Have you ever seen a dog growl, show its teeth, or give a quick nip? What about punching you with their nose, or snapping at you? Those are warning signs of aggression. Aggression is the most serious behavior problem in dogs. It starts with warning signs, and can end up in an attack if you're not paying attention. Unfortunately, many times people don't recognize the signs and don't step in fast enough to prevent bites or attacks.

Our Animal Services Team starts a Dangerous Animal Investigation when a dog has bitten or attacked multiple times, or an attack caused severe injuries or death. In a typical year, the Team investigates about 5 to 10 dogs. Unfortunately, there are already five ongoing investigations so far in 2022. It's not clear what's causing this spike because there's very little in common between the cases. In these cases, there are different breeds, ages, sexes, and backgrounds. The dogs in these cases have repeatedly bitten people and injured other animals. One incident involved a cat dying from injuries after a dog attack.

What a Dangerous Animal Investigation involves:

- Interviewing victims
- Meeting the dog and learning about its history and environment
- Asking neighbors about their experiences with the dog
- Meeting with the owner to discuss how to prevent future incidents

To prevent future incidents, Animal Services may require restrictions, like training classes, fencing, or leashing and muzzling when the dog is off the owner's property. In every case, they require: mandatory spaying or neutering, microchipping getting a current dog license, banning visits to dog parks.



You can prevent aggressive dog behavior

Dogs might act aggressive when they're protecting their territory, their family, or their possessions. They may also act aggressive when they're afraid, frustrated, or in pain. There's no easy answer to why a dog becomes aggressive, but you can prevent aggression in your dog.

- Learn as much as you can about any dog you adopt or buy, including its history and breed traits
- Take classes to help you bond and learn about each other in a safe and structured environment
- Take your dog to a veterinarian for an exam, vaccinations, and spaying or neutering when they are old enough
- Always make sure your dog is leashed and under control when off your property
- Never allow your dog to run loose or wander
- Learn about types of aggression, risk factors for aggression, and behavior changes you can make
- Get help for your aggressive dog

If you recognize aggressive behaviors in your dog, don't hesitate to reach out for help, because problems tend to worsen if you don't take action. There are many behaviorists in our area that can help if you see concerning behavior from your dog. There are also low-cost veterinary and behavior programs for those who need them.

It is a great way to help out and to meet other FOHP members. 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Meet Fire Station #9 Apparatus Engineer Paul Bowers

Where are you stationed?

Station 9 (Midvale Blvd.) on the 'C' shift
What was your previous position/station assignment?
Firefighter at Station 4 on the A shift
How long have you been serving with the MFD?
8 years

Why did you want to be a driver/engineer?

I wanted to be an AE to expand my scope and responsibilities with the MFD. I really enjoy the job of driving and learning all the little nuances that a territory can have.

What do you like about your station and the territory?

I really like the neighborhood feel that Station 9 has. Being born and raised (and currently living) on the west side of Madison, I really enjoy being able to serve the residents in this new role.



How has your perspective changed now that you're an Apparatus Engineer? Do you see your role in a new way? Having been a firefighter and being the person who is actually doing more of the hands-on skills on calls, it was a change to now be the person who is more assisting, stepping back, and getting the big picture of the incident. This could be anything from scene and crew protection on a car accident to being the outside set of eyes on a fire call.

What qualities or skills do you see as crucial for your new position?

Being an AE requires you to stay calm and problem solve. The first five minutes of a fire is very fast-paced for an AE and sets the tone for the rest of the incident. For the most part, if something is going wrong, there's a reason for it, and an AE needs to be able to figure out how to fix it.

2022 Madison Police Department Summer Strategic Plan

excerpts from post by Jason Freedman, Captain of Midtown Police District, May 31, 2022

Hello Midtown, I am posting about the 2022 MPD Summer Strategic Plan. There are three citywide priorities for this plan: Shots Fired, Stolen Cars, and Hazardous Driving (specifically the Beltline, E Washington Ave, and Mineral Point Rd).

- The above priorities were identified using a variety of data points and sources; but were also selected due to their impact on the safety and security of residents of the city. As with 2021, the goal is to reduce these crimes by 15%. For our traffic priority, the goal is to reduce injury crashes in these corridors by 15%.
- MPD will continue to utilize data to identify hot-spots, crime trends, and those offenders who are committing the focal crimes. With that data in hand, different strategies (high visibility, education, foot patrol, proactive enforcement, use of special teams, etc.) will be employed in an effort to cool off those hot-spots and locate and arrest offenders. While we will focus on perpetrators and hot-spots involving shots fired and stolen cars, we will



be monitoring other criminal activity. We will also be tracking our dosage (how much officer time) was spent on certain efforts to try to assess the efficacy of particular strategies.

• In sum, our goals with the strategic plan are to: 1) use data to identify specific areas of concern; 2) apply and track departmental resources used; and 3) use data to assess whether or not what we are doing is effective.

As Midtown addresses our traffic zones (Mineral Point Rd and Beltline), crime hot-spots and prolific offenders, there may be increased police presence, or the use of special units, equipment, and tactics. When circumstances allow, I will use this blog [www.cityofmadison.com/police/midtown/blotter.cfm] to communicate what is going on in Midtown.

Effective policing in our community requires partnership: what are you seeing and what are your concerns? We rely on you, our community, to provide us information, not only to address the above priorities, but also to help us identify other issues. If you are experiencing problems that are impacting the health and safety of your neighborhood, please call! The non-emergency number for MPD is 608-255-2345; non-emergency is a great mechanism to use for an incident after the fact, or to report information like suspicious activity and quality of life issues (i.e. noise complaints).

Which brings me to traffic: I know that traffic is a major concern of many residents in Midtown. Speeding, reckless driving, and unsafe driving appear endemic in Midtown and indeed across Madison. Mineral Point Rd is a significant generator of traffic complaints, but it is certainly not the only one. Midtown will continue to address traffic concerns throughout the district. To aid in the collection of accurate information, please report your traffic concerns to: www. cityofmadison.com/reportaproblem/trafficenforcement.cfm

We don't just want to hear from you when there is a problem! It is important and valuable to meet, talk, and engage outside of calls for service. If you have a community event or meeting and would like someone from Midtown to join you,

please let me know—Midtown has liaison officers assigned to our Neighborhood Associations and these officers are a great first choice. [The Sunset Village Community liaison officer is PO William Needelman, 7 a.m.-3 p.m.]
