Mass layoffs. Tariffs. Major weather events. We are experiencing a time of high uncertainty. This uncertainty can make us feel overwhelmed — I know I do. But if we allow ourselves to become apathetic, we lose the power to keep our community strong. When I start to feel powerless, I focus on the things I can control. Here are a few things we can do.

If you've never planted a vegetable garden, perhaps now is the time to start. There are lots of resources available, from free seeds at our libraries to gardening tips from UW-Extension. Then, consider sharing your bounty with those less fortunate. For example, one year I had extra tomato starts, and a friend took them to a Madison Area Food Pantry Garden. Every one of our food pantries is seeing increasing demand, so whatever you can spare would be helpful.

Other ways you can help include offering rides to appointments for those unable to drive, taking in a boarder, tutoring a student, or sharing your skills in carpentry, painting, or electrical work. While these are a few suggestions, I'm sure you can think of additional ways to step up for your neighbors who might need a little extra help in the coming months. Local organizations seeking to match volunteers with community needs include RSVP of Dane County, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Dane County, and United Way of Dane County.

It is truly an honor to serve as your Alder. I commit to doing everything I can to protect our community and build our resilience through the next two years and beyond. Please reach out with concerns or questions, if you would like to provide resources to your neighbors, or have ideas about how to strengthen our community connections. Sunset Village Neighborhood and Nearby Project Updates

Midvale Blvd (University Ave to Mineral Point Rd) Safe Streets Improvements

Alder Vidaver reports, "Due to extensive community feedback, city staff have pushed back the Midvale Blvd resurfacing project to 2026, and will assess additional options for the configuration of the resurfaced street. I highly recommend subscribing to automatic updates for the project." City of Madison Resurfacing Program: Mineral Point Road from Glenway to Midvale

Alder Vidaver reports that this project will be delayed until 2027.

Blackhawk at University Intersection Improvements: Construction in 2025

The project is a new pedestrian crossing configuration with no left turns onto University Ave. Tom Mohr, Assistant Director of Traffic Engineering, reports, "Assuming we have a contractor, the work at University/Blackhawk will take place following the MMSD [Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District] nightly westbound lane closures on University Avenue—so likely late summer." Redevelopment at the Moore's Towing Site on Mineral Point Road

The developers, JMTG, LLC (Gerardo Jimenez and Jeff Mack) presented initial plans at a public information meeting on November 30, 2023, for a 4-story building with a 5th story setback and 53 residential units. Still no updates.

Redevelopment at 3575 (formerly 3535-3553) University Avenue

This project is a five story multi-family/commercial mixed-use building with two levels of underground parking and 71+ residential units. The project went before a virtual public meeting in May, 2024 without neighborhood opposition. Since then, the developers acquired the two corner houses at the north end of N. Meadow Lane, which will allow more units and parking, as well as driving access on N. Meadow Lane. Developer representative, Randy Christianson, reports that the large hackberry tree on N. Meadow Lane will be preserved. Demolition is planned for September-October, 2025.

Package of Housing Ordinance Changes Could Affect Sunset Village

The City of Madison's Common Council voted on February 25 to approve a set of changes to the zoning code designed to support the creation of more types of housing. The package of changes — first introduced in January by Mayor Satya Rhodes-Conway and Alders Juliana Bennett, John Duncan, Tag Evers, Derek Field, MGR Govindarajan, John Guequierre, Sabrina Madison, Dina Nina Martinez-Rutherford, and Regina Vidaver — was created to provide more flexibility for homeowners looking to build or modify their single-family homes and Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs), better facilitate small residential infill projects where they're already allowed, and improve the City's review process for proposed demolitions of non-historic buildings.

The zoning code changes approved include:

- Allowing for more options in the placement of an attached garage in residential districts
- Allowing open porches to be in a part of a lot's required side yard setback
- Making the side yard setback the same for single-story buildings and buildings that are more than one story
- Increasing the allowable interior size for an attached ADU to be up to 1,000 square feet
- Increasing the allowable footprint for a detached ADU to be up to 1,000 square feet
- Eliminating the limit on the number of bedrooms in an ADU

Ultimately, City staff believe these changes will allow more options for homeowners while also further supporting the development of more "missing middle" housing across Madison. Additionally, these code changes make it easier to build and modify single-family homes.






Meet your newest and youngest newsletter carrier, Pippa!

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Racial Covenants in Our Neighborhoods

Neighbors, This month, I am providing information on our <u>Prejudice in Places</u> project about racial covenants in Dane County (spoiler alert – the near west side is a primary area with these covenants).

<u>Prejudice in Places</u> is a partnership between the Planning department, Dane County Historical Society, Boys & Girls Club, and others, to identify and confirm discriminatory restrictive language in Dane County real estate records. The project's preliminary search of digitized land records from 1937-1969 yielded more than 500 land records that are now mapped and many of these land records are on the near west side of Madison, particularly in Shorewood and along Midvale. These discriminatory restrictions are void and unenforceable so there are no real impacts today but they are a stark reminder of the systems and context that have led to different outcomes for Black and Brown people right here in Dane County. An example of one of these covenants (note the language is repugnant but I think it's important to hear): "The premises shall not be sold or conveyed to any Jew, Italian, Negro or member of the yellow race." Note that there isn't really a good pathway to remove a racial covenant from your own land record, but the County is working with the State to see if we can develop a simple process for anyone that wishes to have theirs removed. The exhibit from the Dane County Historical Society on this issue is excellent and will be traveling to local libraries throughout 2025. Sequoya is scheduled for October but there are plenty of places to see it prior, all listed on the website. I believe this project helps start important conversations and draws a direct line to racial discrimination and adverse outcomes for people right here in our own backyards.

Racial Covenants in Our Sunset Village Neighborhood

Most Sunset Village neighborhood properties have racial covenants. See the black boxes on the maps below. Aaron C. Krebs, Deputy Land Records Administrator for Dane County Planning & Development, says, "The black boxes are the property's legal description on the document that contains the discriminatory language. That means that the discriminatory language once applied to the entirety of the black box on the map." He also explains that the locations of the Sunset Village covenants are "probably due to that area being developed between 1910 and 1950 when these discriminatory documents were used as the city was growing westward towards the Hilldale area and eastward towards what is now Highway 51."
