Sunset Village Neighborhood and Nearby Project Updates

Blackhawk Ave at University Ave: Median Island and RRFB (Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon)

Redevelopment at 3535-3553 University Avenue and 733-737 N. Meadow Lane


The project has expanded to a six-story mixed-use building with 4,268 sq. ft. of commercial space and 146 apartments, and driving access on N. Meadow Lane. Demolition is now scheduled for the first of December.

Midvale Blvd Resurfacing & Safety Improvement Project


This 2026 project, to Midvale Boulevard from Mineral Point Road to University Avenue, includes intersection safety improvements, pedestrian crossing improvements, bike lanes, and partial replacement of asphalt pavement. To

accommodate driving, biking and continue to offer some street parking, one option the City is proposing is to narrow a portion of the median to maintain parking, and to eliminate street parking on residential blocks. City of Madison Engineering Division conducted an online survey to assess citizen opinions on three bike safety options.



Option 2—Midvale Boulevard to Meadow Lane Bike Boulevard

Option 3—Segoe Road Improvements & Owen Drive Bike Boulevard



City staff presented the project to the Transportation Commission on September 10th, 2025. Alders Regina Vidaver and Bill Tishler spoke in support of Option 3, representing the substantial majority of their constituents on the online survey. The Commission members, citing Complete Green Streets priorities, voted five to three to move forward with Option 1, with a condition to restore Midvale parking when the street undergoes full reconstruction in the future. A Public Hearing, yet to be scheduled, is required to remove the residential parking. The project is not yet approved by the Board of Public Works or Common Council.

Alder Vidaver reports that she and Alder Tishler are working with staff to determine what next steps will be in this process. Most likely, the project will be delayed.





News from Friends of Hoyt Park

The Friends of Hoyt Park, Inc. (FoHP), celebrating their 30-year anniversary in 2025, assists Madison Parks to maintain the historical, recreational and natural beauty of Hoyt Park. Twenty-three-acre Hoyt Park, adjacent to the Regent neighborhood, offers woodlands, prairies, quiet areas of respite and gathering places for social activities. If you have not yet visited the park, put it on your list of neighborhood walks.

The FoHP sponsors family-friendly events inviting the public to enjoy Hoyt Park. We have connected with the Madison chapter of the Feminist Birding Club to hold guided birding walks during the Spring and Fall Migrations, held monthly evening nature walks with focused topics such as wild edibles, history of Hoyt Park, native flowers and fungi in the park and an educational program on the Hoyt Park bats with an acoustic survey of the bats as they come out to forage insects. Finally, we will have a December Full Moon Guided Night Walk, encouraging the public to view the park from a new perspective and when snow comes, a popular Winter Sledding Event.



Through generous donations and membership dues,

the Friends have been able to support two Hoyt Park Conservation Rangers who carry out restoration and maintenance projects under the shared guidance of Madison Parks and the Friends. In select restoration areas, the Rangers along with FoHP volunteers have removed invasive woody shrubs and replaced these invasives with native shrubs. Because these areas now have more sunlight we have planted plugs of native flowering plants, donated by Plant Dane or grown by volunteers who participated in our December 2024 Winter Sowing Workshop. The Rangers have spent time maintaining and repairing Hoyt's trails and clearing poison ivy so that the public can safely walk through the park. During the Fall season, volunteers collected seed from Hoyt's two restored prairies. This seed, along with purchased seed for plant diversity, has been spread in cleared restoration areas to promote a healthy understory. Finally, the Friends have developed a monitoring plan to track the effectiveness of our restoration efforts.

Our September FoHP annual meeting featured Badger Talks speaker and FoHP member, Stan Temple, who spoke of how the timeless ideas of Aldo Leopold can be applied today to promote hope for the future of our natural areas despite the wounds that mankind has inflicted. Professor Temple reminded us that we can take actions, no matter how seemingly trivial, such as calling our government officials to let them know how we stand on environmental issues and participating in restoration volunteer activities. The talk was followed by our FoHP business meeting that included the election of 4 board members, two of whom were new members of the

Friends.
