I recently had the opportunity to tour one of Purple Cow Organics' composting sites alongside Jerod Reuter and Dane County Waste & Renewables Director, John Welch.

Purple Cow Organics and Dane County Waste & Renewables exemplify the power of public-private partnerships in Dane County, a partnership that sparks innovative and sustainable solutions.

Purple Cow Organics has been an outstanding partner, transforming piles of organic waste into high-quality compost. This process not only diverts food waste and other organics from the landfill, where they would produce methane, a greenhouse gas more than 20 times more potent than carbon dioxide, but also preserves valuable landfill space.

Most recently, Purple Cow Organics has begun composting organic materials such as animal bedding and manure from the Henry Vilas Zoo, as well as food waste collected through Dane County's new Food Scrap Program, which offers drop-off bins for residents across the county.



Why Do Our Neighborhood Kids Attend Two Different Schools?






If you've ever wondered why children from our neighborhood attend both Lincoln and Midvale elementary schools, the answer lies in a partnership that has shaped our community for over 40 years. In 1984, the Madison School Board created the Midvale-Lincoln pair as part of a desegregation plan designed to ensure all students had access to diverse, thriving school communities. Students in our neighborhood attend kindergarten through second grade at Midvale, located in the Westmorland neighborhood, and third through fifth grade at Lincoln, in the Burr Oaks neighborhood, creating a unique public schooling experience that connects communities across both campuses. Today, Lincoln and Midvale serve approximately 725 students, 31% of whom are English learners.

Families in the Midvale-Lincoln attendance area consistently express satisfaction with the community they've found at both schools. Parents recognize that the paired model fulfills the promise of public education by bringing diverse communities together in a positive environment that prioritizes every child's well-being. The transition between schools in third grade, which some families initially worry about, turns out to be remarkably smooth thanks to factors like good student preparation and a strong, inclusive culture. "We feel so fortunate that our daughter gets to attend Lincoln Elementary. It is such a welcoming, fun, community-focused school. The teachers and staff are excellent, and my daughter looks forward to going to school every day," says neighbor Hannah Gaines Day.

There are many ways to support our neighborhood schools, whether you have school-age children or not. Rake for Our Lakes

Raking leaves is a great way to help our lakes from your home. Leaves contain phosphorus, and when they break down, they can create one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. 50% of the annual phosphorus loading to our lakes from urban areas comes from fall leaf debris in the streets.

When left in the street, stormwater passes through leaves like a teabag. This creates a phosphorusrich tea that washes down storm drains and into our lakes. Raking leaves from the street edge (three feet from the curb) and onto lawns will help



fertilize the grass and reduce cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) blooms in our lakes. Leaves can also be composted or used as mulch around your yard, or properly bagged/piled on the grass street terrace for municipal collection.

Unjust Deeds Exhibit at Sequoya Library in October

Unjust Deeds, an exhibition sharing the history of racial covenants in Dane County and beyond, has come to Sequoya Library. For most of the 20th Century, racial covenants were an insidious tool used nationwide to segregate whites from Blacks and other minorities in America's burgeoning suburbs and residential neighborhoods. Racial covenants were clauses inserted into property deeds to prevent non-Whites and non-Christians from buying or occupying land. Although no longer valid or enforceable, they can still be found in the land deeds of almost every American community, including Dane County. Racial covenants were made illegal with the passage of the Fair Housing Act in 1968. Nevertheless, their impacts are pervasive and still with us today. Homeowners are encouraged to look up their properties using the **Prejudice in Places** map online to see if their house has a discriminatory covenant on the deed. If so, you can file a "Discharge and Release of Discriminatory Restriction Affecting Real Property" form. More information at:


